At 7PM, the Waxhaw-Weddington Sunrise Rotary Club will host the biggest ever Waxhaw Town and Country Run Friday April 24 at 7 p.m. in downtown Waxhaw. The Rotary Club invites participants to join them and the race's sponsors in benefiting the Union County Crisis Assistance Ministries.

At last year's race 251 runners ran through historic Waxhaw—past shops and historic houses with more than 200 onlookers cheering them on. This year about 300 runners are expected with 600 others in attendance. Club President Larry Hook says, "Rotary is based on four avenues of service, and community service covers the projects and activities the club undertakes to improve life in its community."

It's a 5K run with computer chip timing and a 1/2 mile Fun Run. Fitness walk and baby joggers are welcome in either event. Check-in begins at 5:30 p.m. on E. North Main near the old the fire station. The 1/2 mile and fitness walk starts at 6:40 p.m. with the 5 K race at 7 p.m. and the baby joggers and wheelchairs at 7:05 p.m.

Certification is pending for the 5K. Donations are \$30 at the race for the 5K and \$12 for the 1/2 mile fun run and will be accepted the evening of the race. Food will be available for purchase and local food vendors will also have free samples. The race's title sponsor is Farms and Estates Realty.

Rotary International is an international service club with 1.2 million members worldwide. Members volunteer their time and talent in living out the Rotary motto, "Service above Self." 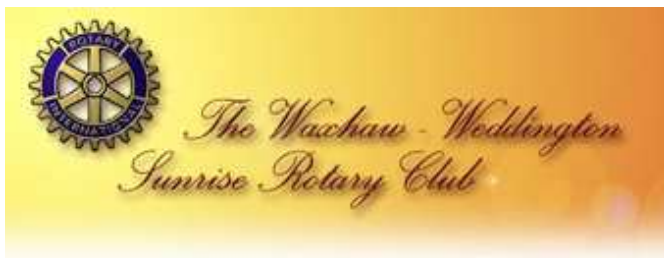

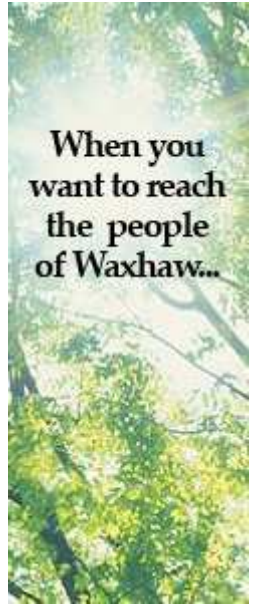

Waxhaw, N.C. Plans are under way for the 2009 Memorial Day Remembrance Ceremony in historic downtown Waxhaw. The program is slated for Saturday, May 23rd beginning with breakfast and registration for veterans at 9am. The official public program will begin at 10am in front of the Waxhaw Military Wall of Honor. The Wall of Honor is located in the East North Main Street block in historic downtown. The program will be emceed by Ken Conrad and will include: the changing of flags by American Legion Post 208, The National Anthem by Laura Pettler, Laying of the wreath, guest speaker John W. Falkenbury Lieutenant colonel, U.S. Army, retired and President of the N.C. USO., a three round volley from the overhead bridge, taps, Ken O'Neil on bag pipes and a symbolic releasing of doves. 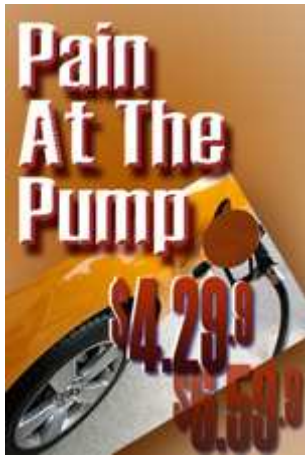

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Originally published on December 20th, 2003 this was the last article written by Ben Stein for E on line. It was, again, passed on to me recently and I have wished to re-print it since I first saw it. Please enjoy it as much as I have.

How Can Someone Who Lives in Insane Luxury Be a Star in Today's World?

As I begin to write this, I "slug" it, as we writers say, which means I put a heading on top of the document to identify it. This heading is "eonline FINAL," and it gives me a shiver to write it. I have been doing this column for so long that I cannot even recall when I started.

Lew Harris, who founded this great site, asked me to do it maybe seven or eight years ago, and I loved writing this column so much for so long I came to believe it would never end.

But again, all things must pass, and my column for E! Online must pass. In a way, it is actually the perfect time for it to pass. Lew, whom I have known forever, was impressed that I knew so many stars at Morton's on Monday nights.

He could not get over it, in fact. So, he said I should write a column about the stars I saw at Morton's and what they had to say.

It worked well for a long time, but gradually, my changing as a person and the world's change have overtaken it. On a small scale, Morton's, while better than ever, no longer attracts as many stars as it used to. It still brings in the rich people in droves and definitely some stars.

I saw Samuel L. Jackson there a few days ago, and we had a nice visit, and right before that, I saw and had a splendid talk with Warren Beatty in an elevator, in which we agreed that Splendor in the Grass was a super movie.

But Morton's is not the star galaxy it once was, though it probably will be again.

Beyond that, a bigger change has happened. I no longer think Hollywood stars are terribly important. They are uniformly pleasant, friendly people, and they treat me better than I deserve to be treated. But a man or woman who makes a huge wage for memorizing lines and reciting them in front of a camera is no longer my idea of a shining star we should all look up to.

How can a man or woman who makes an eight-figure wage and lives in insane luxury really be a star in today's world, if by a "star" we mean someone bright and powerful and attractive as a role model?

Real stars are not riding around in the backs of limousines or in Porsches or getting trained in yoga or Pilates and eating only raw fruit while they have Vietnamese girls do their nails. They can be interesting, nice people, but they are not heroes to me any longer.

A real star is the soldier of the 4th Infantry Division who poked his head into a hole on a farm near Tikrit, Iraq. He could have been met by a bomb or a hail of AK-47 bullets. Instead, he faced an abject Saddam Hussein and the gratitude of all of the decent people of the world.

A real star is the U.S. soldier who was sent to disarm a bomb next to a road north of Baghdad. He approached it, and the bomb went off and killed him.

A real star, the kind who haunts my memory night and day, is the U.S. soldier in Baghdad who saw a little girl playing with a piece of unexploded ordnance on a street near where he was guarding a station. He pushed her aside and threw himself on it just as it exploded. He left a family desolate in California and a little girl alive in Baghdad.

The stars who deserve media attention are not the ones who have lavish weddings on TV but the ones who patrol the streets of Mosul even after two of their buddies were murdered and their bodies battered and stripped for the sin of trying to protect Iraqis from terrorists.

We put couples with incomes of \$100 million a year on the covers of our magazines. The noncoms and officers who barely scrape by on military pay but stand on guard in Afghanistan and Iraq and on ships and in submarines and near the Arctic Circle are anonymous as they live and die.

I am no longer comfortable being a part of the system that has such poor values, and I do not want to perpetuate those values by pretending that who is eating at Morton's is a big subject.

There are plenty of other stars in the American firmament. The policemen and women who go off on patrol in South Central and have no idea if they will return alive. The orderlies and paramedics who bring in people who have been in terrible accidents and prepare them for surgery. The teachers and nurses who throw their whole spirits into caring for autistic children. The kind men and women who work in hospices and in cancer wards.

Think of each and every fireman who was running up the stairs at the World Trade Center as the towers began to collapse.

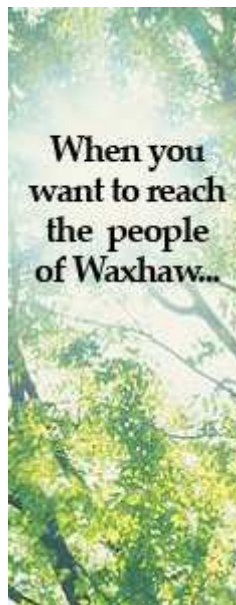

Now you have my idea of a real hero.

Last column, I told you a few of the rules I had learned to keep my sanity. Well, here is a final one to help you keep your sanity and keep you in the running for stardom: We are puny, insignificant creatures.

We are not responsible for the operation of the universe, and what happens to us is not terribly important. God is real, not a fiction, and when we turn over our lives to Him, he takes far better care of us than we could ever do for ourselves.

In a word, we make ourselves sane when we fire ourselves as the directors of the movie of our lives and turn the power over to Him.

I came to realize that life lived to help others is the only one that matters. This is my highest and best use as a human.

I can put it another way. Years ago, I realized I could never be as great an actor as Olivier or as good a comic as Steve Martin--or Martin Mull or Fred Willard--or as good an economist as Samuelson or Friedman or as good a writer as Fitzgerald. Or even remotely close to any of them.

But I could be a devoted father to my son, husband to my wife and, above all, a good son to the parents who had done so much for me. This came to be my main task in life.

I did it moderately well with my son, pretty well with my wife and well indeed with my parents (with my sister's help). I cared for and paid attention to them in their declining years. I stayed with my father as he got sick, went into extremis and then into a coma and then entered immortality with my sister and me reading him the Psalms.

This was the only point at which my life touched the lives of the soldiers in Iraq or the firefighters in New York. I came to realize that life lived to help others is the only one that matters and that it is my duty, in return for the lavish life God has devolved upon me, to help others He has placed in my path. This is my highest and best use as a human.

The first show of the Union County Saddle Club Show season scheduled for Saturday, April 25th. It looks like we're going to have GREAT weather this time, we've got one of our favorite Judges returning (Leroy Melton,) and we are very excited to finally be able to show off all the hard work that we've done getting the buildings and grounds ready.



Along with our new class sheet, there are several new procedures in addition to ones that we started using last year, and I would like to point them out so that you know about them in advance.

1. **Don't forget we have new starting times! Gates will open at 7 AM – English division starts at 9 AM, Western/Gaited to start at approximately 4:30 PM!**
2. **We will now be checking Coggins' certificates prior to unloading.** There will be a checkpoint just inside the gate. Please be sure to have your ORIGINAL certificates readily available so that we do not end up backing up traffic into the road. If you do not have your certificates, you will not be allowed to unload your horses or proceed past a "holding area" if someone goes to get them for you. Only original Coggins Certificates will be accepted – no copies!
3. All ponies must be presented to the Show Office and measured on the concrete pad on the far side of the building. One stick will be used for all ponies throughout the season. **Each pony must be measured and logged PRIOR to their first class of the first show attended.** Ponies that have not been measured will not be allowed to show in Pony Classes or gather points towards the Pony Award from any other class. All ponies must be measured and logged by the Show Chairman.
4. Please allow some extra time to fill out the annual paperwork such as the liability waiver and to obtain a new show number. All class sheets and other registration paperwork will be in the clubhouse to be filled out to reduce waiting time at the show office. We are going to continue to offer advance registration online to speed up check in times. Check out our website for deadlines and more details for advance online registration. You are welcome to use your number from last year as long as no one has already requested it.

Please be sure to check our website for new High Points Awards Divisions and qualifying classes. We also still have some class sponsorships available – this form is also available on our website.

We are ALWAYS looking for volunteers to help run the shows. Did you know that you can earn vouchers to apply towards your show fees by helping the ring crew, being a "ribbon girl/boy," etc? 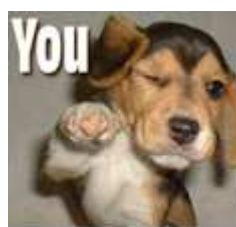
